- 2. English Brook needs a new approximate study. Roads were flooded in this area during Hurricane Irene.
- 3. West Brook needs a new detailed study from the confluence with Lake George to the state land boundary. There is development along the stream in the vicinity of Lake George.



- 4. Prospect Mountain Brook needs a new detailed study from the confluence with Lake George to the state land boundary. There is development along the stream in the vicinity of Lake George
- 5. A revised approximate/detailed study is needed for unnamed tributary to Lake George from the confluence with Lake George to Route 9. (Portions of the stream are approximate and portions are detailed currently.)
- 6. A revised approximate study is needed for Glen Lake Outlet. There was a dam failure in this area in 2011-2012.
- 7. Other streams that are in need of a restudy are Cemetery Brook, Halfway Brook, Unnamed Tributary at Homer and Quaker Avenues, Finkle Brook, and Indian Brook.

General comment: there has been widespread development and changes in hydrology that have impacted the county. Urban areas should be prioritized for new or updated studies.

There were other tributaries noted that are located on state land that currently have approximate studies. These areas should be reviewed, but given that they are on state land, updates are not a high priority.

- 2. Batten Kill from the Vermont border to the confluence with the Hudson River is in need of a revised detailed study. There are major inaccuracies on the FIRM and a high level of vulnerability to flooding in this area.
- 3. Given past flooding incidents, restudies of the Mettawee River and Indian River within the Towns of Whitehall and Granville are also desired.



Restudies of the Hudson River (Fort Edward, Greenwich, and Easton) and White Creek (Salem, Cambridge, White Creek) were also requested. However, these areas are outside of the Discovery project area.

- 5. A revised approximate/detailed study is needed for unnamed tributary to Lake George from the confluence with Lake George to Route 9. (Portions of the stream are approximate and portions are detailed currently.)
- 6. A revised approximate study is needed for Glen Lake Outlet. There was a dam failure in this area in 2011-2012.
- 7. Other streams that are in need of a restudy are Cemetery Brook, Halfway Brook, Unnamed Tributary at Homer and Quaker Avenues, Finkle Brook, and Indian Brook.







4. Prospect Mountain Brook needs a new detailed study from the confluence with Lake George to the state land boundary. There is development along the stream in the vicinity of Lake George

A revised approximate/detailed study is needed for unnamed tributary to Lake George from the confluence with Lake George to Route 9. (Portions of the stream are approximate and portions are detailed currently.)

6. A revised approximate study is needed for Glen Lake Outlet. There was a dam failure in this area in 2011-2012.

7. Other streams that are in need of a restudy are Cemetery Brook, Halfway Brook, Unnamed Tributary at Homer and Quaker Avenues, Finkle Brook, and Indian Brook.

General comment: there has been widespread development and changes in hydrology that have impacted the county. Urban areas should be prioritized for new or updated studies.

There were other tributaries noted that are located on state land that currently have approximate studies. These areas should be reviewed, but given that they are on state land, updates are not a high priority.



Dear Mr. Nechamen:

Thank you for soliciting input from the City of Plattsburgh as part of your new Risk Mapping, Assessment, and Planning Project for the Lake Champlain Watershed. The additional areas that you listed in your August 25, 2016 letter do represent areas we believe updated floodplain mapping is needed.

However, I would like to offer the following clarification:

- 1. The Dead (Scomotion) Creek area of concern would be more accurately described as "Scomotion Creek from its confluence with Lake Champlain to the northern corporate (City) limit."
- 2. The Saranac River area of concern would be more accurately described as "Saranac River from its confluence with Lake Champlain through Main Mill Dam Lake for a distance of 3.2 miles."

In addition, we would request that the following areas of concern be added:

- 3. Lake Champlain Shoreline from the Northern Corporate (City Limit) at the City Beach southward along the shoreline a distance of approximately 9,000 ft. to the Wilcox Dock Property on Cumberland Avenue.
- 4. Lake Champlain Shoreline from the confluence of the Saranac River southward approximately 500 ft to the City Marina and adjacent private marina.

Once again, thank you for involving the City of Plattsburgh in this important process.
