





We would like to thank your community for participating in the North Country Watersheds Discovery meetings held in mid-September 2019.

These Discovery meetings were part of a new Risk Mapping, Assessment, and Planning (Risk MAP) project for the North Country Watersheds that is being conducted by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). The purpose of the Discovery project is to review local flood risk and mapping data in order to determine if updated floodplain mapping is needed in your community.

All information provided will be considered when developing the scope of the Risk MAP project, including, but not limited to, the development of new digital Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs). Please understand that budget constraints will prevent us from fulfilling all of the requested studies at this time, but every request will be considered, and all unfulfilled requests will be officially cataloged as a stream study need for future remapping projects.

Based on the information gathered at the September Discovery meeting, it is our understanding that your community's flood mapping requests, in order of importance, are as follows:

- 1: General flood hazard inaccuracies along the Indian River (a: near the village office and lift stations/waste water management, b: area east of Sand Street and north of the railroad).
- 2: Flooding is generally seasonal, with snow melt and spring rain.
