

A mapping error on the current FIRM was also noted in the vicinity of Knoxboro Road that needs to be corrected – the stream is not included with the mapped floodplain.
- A new detailed study for Sconondoa Creek is needed. This is currently an approximately study – there are significant flooding issues in this area recently and the stream has shifted course.






